2. "On one level, the play, *Ti-Jean and His Brothers*, cautions the audience about pride."

Write an essay in which you describe TWO instances in which a character appears to be proud. You must also discuss how a character reacts to ONE of the instances described. Finally, you must examine how the playwright uses ONE dramatic technique to develop characters.

You must also discuss the lessons Jem OR Scout learns from ONE of the characters described. Finally, you must examine ONE narrative technique the writer uses to portray characters.

**6.** "The Caco sisters, Martine and Atie in *Breath, Eyes, Memory* are both trapped in pain. Neither can heal."

Write an essay in which you describe the nature of the pain experienced by EACH of these characters. You must also discuss the outcome of that pain for ONE of these characters. Finally, you must examine ONE technique the writer uses to portray pain in the novel.

For EACH story, describe the child protagonist. You must also discuss how ONE child protagonist influences the readers' response. Finally, for EACH story, you must examine ONE technique the writer uses to portray the story from the viewpoint of a child.

8. From the prescribed list, choose TWO stories you have studied in which a strong male or female character causes a significant change in the perspective of a character.

For EACH story describe ONE strong male or female character. For ONE story, you must discuss a significant event which results in a changed perspective of another character. Finally, for EACH story, you must examine ONE technique the writer uses to portray changes in the character's perspective.
